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## Developing Supportive Housing for At-Risk Families

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[New Hope Housing](#), a group that provides permanent, affordable and supportive single-room occupancy housing, recently broke ground on its first development designed to serve homeless and at-risk families. The development, named New Hope Housing at Reed (“NHH at Reed”), will include 187 one-, two- and three-bedroom apartment units and offer supportive housing to homeless and at-risk families.

The plan is to serve low- to moderate-income families earning 30-60 percent of Area Median Income (AMI), which in Houston for a family of four is around \$20,000 to about \$41,000. This new unit will be in a park-like setting close to Star of Hope’s 41-acre family development campus, called Cornerstone Community, which will provide a variety of emergency and recovery services for women and children.
